THE ALCUIN SOCIETY, VANCOUVER DESIGN AWARDS, PUBLICATIONS OF 1991

THE UNDERSIGNED JUDGES met on April 18, 1992 to examine the 230 books submitted in competition by their publishers and/or designers. This represents a slight increase over the number submitted last year. As in previous years, not every Canadian publisher known to produce books of high quality chose to enter. While this makes it impossible to certify that we have picked the very best designed books produced in the country for the following awards, the quality of submissions ensures that these are representative of the best that the arts of the Canadian book can offer.

The categories, as most recently revised by the Society's Design Awards Committee in 1989, are:

An appropriate category is checked on the entry form accompanying each book submitted but the Society's Committee or the judges may assign a book to a more appropriate category. First, second, and third prizes are available in each category, with ties permitted; in addition, honourable mentions are allowed. Judging is based on the suitability and harmony of type, illustration (if any), layout, and materials used (both in the text block and for the binding/covering/wrapper) in relation to the book's subject matter, intended audience, etc.

These five books represent very different content visually presented in different but appropriate ways, each eminently suitable to its purpose. First prize went unhesitatingly and unanimously to a book whose design might be called imitative rather than original, but it suits the typographic originality of its author perfectly and is technically very well produced except that the spine lacks curvature: essential in a good hardcover book if not in a human body). The second-prize winner is also a hardcover book with many notable design details such as the chapter heads and sidebars, despite a cluttered title page which works better in its coloured version of the dust jacket. It is about, rather than for, a child; the simplicity and openness of its typography are suitable and appealing. Two third prizes go, one to a hardcover and one to a paperback book. The former, by Doris McCarthy, demonstrates the virtues of understated homogeneity even to the touches of colour uniting the cover, endpapers, and jacket. The other relies on skilful use of typographic contrasts in matter outside the running text. Gordon Robertson, who did its cover, is also responsible for the even better cover for which honourable mention goes to the final book listed above.




Fig. 6 Parables and Other Allegories p. 185

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


Fig. 7 Dessins d'architecture de l'avant-garde sovietique p. 1

Gallery/museum exhibition catalogues have always featured among the Alcuin prize winners in this category—as they should, since they are typically subsidized and designed by people particularly conscious of artistic considerations. The thoughtful work put into the catalogues of the Centre canadien d'architecture/ Canadian Centre for Architecture in Montreal is well represented in the first two prize winners. (These are, incidentally, published in both English and French editions; it just happens that the publisher submitted in this competition the English edition of one and the French edition of the other.) The first prize acknowledges the particularly complex problems posed by the content of this catalogue. The second prize acknowledges (like the first prize in the previous category) a perfect matching of design to the Bauhaus-influenced style of the inter-war period with which it deals. The full-length sewing of its single signature is a technical feature also worth mention. The National Gallery's Sterbak catalogue has a particularly successful cover as well as dealing with the two-column English/French layout with many intra-text illustrations successfully. The book of Sam Tata portraits deserves mention for its careful layout and production by a designer/printer often previously acknowledged in these Alcuin awards.

Books in this category tend to be produced either very well or very poorly; this year, only two stood out, both large-format hardcover books. One met all expectations for a prize for the consistency of its treatment of text, illustrations, and colour. An honourable mention acknowledges many fine features of the book on roses.




Fig. 8 Canadian Living's Country Cooking p. 91

The poetry awards go to a more diverse group of designers/printers than in previous years. An unusual but very effective choice of paper is one of several fine features of the first prize winner. The sans-serif type of the second-prize winner sits well in relatively short line-lengths on the tall format page. Every year, the judges have hoped to see a larger number of French-language submissions; the third-prize winner indicates the high quality of what is doubtless available. An honourable mention acknowledges a fine cover/title-page introduction to the Pass poems.




Fig. 9 Earth Moth title page

think fangs instead rabies and dark lofts remember playing kick the can in late evening



The judges placed the first-prize winner into this, rather than the poetry category because it is replete with variant readings, scholarly apparatus, and annotations. They are all clearly presented in as unintimidating a fashion as possible. Two second prizes go to a pair of not-quite-identical siblings, textbooks which must pack pose exposition, photographic and line illustration, review questions, extended quotations, graphs, etc. into a coherent whole and do so very well using contrasting type and spatial relations on the page. The Lone Pine Press is a previous Alcuin winner for the same kind of book recognized by a third prize this year, in which clear coloured drawings and brief text notes make for a useful field guide. The index given honourable mention is an example of the better attempts to produce an easily consultable bibliography, yet shows the hazards of computer typesetting when finances do not allow a review by the human eye to deal with faults such as poor line-breaks.






Fig. 13 The Collected Poetry of Malcolm Lowry p. 120 Fig. 14 Nature Alberta p. 21

This year's prizes for limited editions go to one quite thin book and one very large book. The Elsteds' book, dated 1988 but only completed and published three years later, is worth the wait in every way. The two-colour presswork is sharp and even; the tipped-in halftones and woodcuts match the overall colouration of the printed pages. Second prize also goes to a bibliography; a lavish production generously spaced out on thick paper with a deckle fore-edge and a very sturdy binding. The text is sensibly presented without right-justification. The presswork, in letterpress as with the other winner, is impeccable; the lithographed halftones are equally well executed.




Fig. 16 The Edgar and Dorothy Davidson Collection title page.

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


Fig. 17 The Anne of Green Gables Treasury p. 89

As in several previous competitions, the children's category provides the most immediately satisfying book of the year. First prize goes to a perfect match of style and content: a book full of visual delights not always expected or noticed at first glance. The very high standard of Canadian children's-book design continues through a second-prize winner, whose subdued soft-tone colours of the full-page illustrations suit the coastal theme and are not overwhelmed by the text setting on facing pages. Two third prizes acknowledge books which treat illustration differently, but equally successfully. Simon Ng's pictures, also featured in an Alcuin Prize winner the year before last, are single-page ones, which Kady Denton's animals jump and strut vigorously from the front cover through to the final page. Finally, honourable mention goes to an author/illustrator/designer/printer/genre combination which won similar mention two years ago for a very similar book obviously worth imitating











Fig. 21 On the Merry-Go-Round p. 11




Fig. 22 The Nightingale endpaper

Concluding Comments

A few names have become well established among the Alcuin awards over the years. Gordon Robertson is gaining prominence among the current group of successful freelance designers. The proportion of Canadian printers among the winners in categories other than juvenile books continues to increase: This year, only two were printed outside this country. Among the children's books, however, all of this year's winners were printed offshore, a regression from some recent years, showing that full-colour work throughout even a smaller book is still hard to justify at Canadian prices. Once again, Friesen Printers of Manitoba are Canadian printers offering the highest quality work, which meeting the production and cost-efficiency demands of a wide variety of commercial publishers. Among the smaller firms, The Porcupine's Quill crops up this year as a printer of winners published by two other firms as well as by itself. Morriss Printing of Victoria has also been present on every previous list of winners.
