The knowledge of its proprietors covers not only books, a search service, local history, folklore, but also insight into colourful historical local personalities, all within the welcoming ambience of a new and used books storefront on Main Street Mission.

Our featured artist Dean Lauzé's art work for the cover is "Mission Abbey", © 2005. It was commissioned and produced in record time. He showed me his workplace — a studio that must be seen to be believed. Here, I saw a flatbed press of a size I would not have believed possible, heard the amazing history of its provenance, and the life story of the previous owner who was a remarkable artist. Lauzé's portfolio shows the work of an artist working in commercial enterprises, as well as finding time for personal interest in etchings and fine press work.
