

### **203. London, British Library, Cotton Nero A. ii**

Three combined MSS: an 11c English prayerbook,  
an 8–9c northern Italian prayerbook,  
a 12c English collection of St. Cuthbert material.

[Part 1: Ker 157 (with BL Cotton Galba A. xiv), Gneuss 342; Part 2: Lowe 2.186]

**HISTORY:** Nero A. ii is a compendium by Robert Cotton (see the note on f. 2r) of three quite distinct manuscripts of diverse origins: Part 1 (ff. 3–13), an 11c A-S private prayer book with a calendar and computational material (it contains no OE, but was almost certainly once part of Cotton Galba A. xiv); Part 2 (ff. 14–45), an 8–9c north Italian collection of devotional texts and liturgical ordinations, compiled before 767 (Hallinger 1963: 79–80), showing Insular decorative elements (e.g., ff. 27v, 45r), probably prepared for private use; and Part 3 (ff. \*44, 46–108 + 1), a 12c small-format compilation of texts on St. Cuthbert. Part 3 is probably the latter half of a manuscript that once contained Bede's prose "Life of St. Cuthbert." The exact relationship of Nero, Part 1, to Galba is not clear, nor is the date of separation known; Nero has escaped the fire and water damage that marks Galba. Part 1 was written at Winchester, probably at St. Mary's (Nunnaminster). Its range of dates is indicated by the inclusion of a lunar table pertaining to the years 1029–1047.

[Further Notes on Part 1: Taken to be part of Galba A. xiv by Ker (*Cat.*, 200) because of similarities in page size, layout, contents, abbreviations and punctuation and in some of the handwriting. At least three hands can be distinguished in this part. Ker and Muir (1988) see the same hand on Nero ff. 10v–12v as on Galba f. 125r. Ker also identifies the "backward sloping" hand on Nero ff. 1–10 with that on Galba f. 2 (the Galba hand seems much less expert), and Nero f. 13v as similar to Galba f. 54 (the similarity seems very general). Lapidge (1981) disputed Ker's conclusions for the unity of the two manuscripts (85–86, where he argues for an origin of Nero in the far west of Wessex, perhaps St. Germans, Cornwall), but Muir's summary of the evidence for unity is conclusively in favor (Muir, xi–xii; see in this series the "History" section in the description of Galba A. xiv for Lapidge's later opinion, that Nero was produced at Winchester for one of its dependencies). According to Muir (xvi), the book (i.e., Nero and Galba considered together) was originally blank and items were written in as occasion offered, without regard for the boundaries of gatherings. The texts seem to be drawn informally from a variety of liturgical and computistical sources and follow

no particular order. Muir suggests (xvii) that the handwriting and Latinity show either beginning or poorly trained writers. (See also the description of Cotton Galba A. xiv.)]

**CODICOLOGICAL DESCRIPTION:** [iii] + [iv] + 109 (present foliation 3–108, 44\* uncounted [+ 1]; older cancelled foliation 1–108 [+ 1]). Rebound and repaired in January 1865. Present average page size 158 x 111 mm. Three modern paper flyleaves; four parchment flyleaves, the first marked "x1," a repaired leaf of a 13c or 14c breviary; the next, "x2" (canceled), has the Cotton press-mark on the verso; "x3" is blank; the fourth, marked "Fol. 1," has an elaborate painted Cottonian frontispiece pasted to the recto and the Cottonian table of contents on the verso (third and fourth now counted as 1 and 2 in the present foliation). Endleaves are modern paper.

#### **COLLATIONS AND CODICOLOGICAL DESCRIPTIONS OF THE THREE PARTS:**

**Part 1:** Hair on outside of all sheets. Writing area 145 x 100 mm. in calendar; 130 x 75 mm. in prayer text. Ff. 3–8 are ruled for 31 lines, with double bounding lines on outside margins (ignored by scribe). Ff. 9–12 are ruled (roughly) for 18 lines (with perhaps 12 extra lines scratched in, scribe using only about one of three) and more or less ignored by scribes. F. 13, which seems more carefully prepared and executed than the rest of Part 1, is ruled for 13 lines. Writing in both Insular and Anglo-Caroline minuscule.

Collation: I<sup>10</sup> (ff. 3–12), II singleton (f. 13).

**Part 2:** At least a quire missing at the beginning. HFHF. 145 x 82 mm. (trimmed at top). Ruled for 19 lines on the outside of the sheet; double scorings on outside margins, single on inside. Thick parchment. Brownish ink, capitals and decorations by scribe, apparently following an Irish-style exemplar.

Collation: I–III<sup>8</sup> (ff. 14–37), IV<sup>8</sup> (2 and 7 half-sheets) (ff. 38–45).

**Part 3:** HFHF. Written area 122 x 66 mm. 25 pencil rulings on each sheet of finely prepared white vellum. Old \*44 blank.

Collation: I<sup>4</sup> (\*44, 46–48, 1 and 4 half-sheets), II–III<sup>12</sup> (ff. 49–72), IV<sup>12</sup> + 1 (ff. 73–84 + f. 85), V–VI<sup>12</sup> (ff. 86–108 + 1). F. 85 (old 84) belongs after f. 47.
