The Annual Career Expo (formerly the Job Fair) was held at SLAIS on March 20, 2009. The Career Expo committee, chaired by SLAIS students Erin Abler and Jenny Borland, was hard at work for months to assemble the 20+ professionals to act as panelists, lead group discussions, and answer questions in individual sessions. The event began with Guy Robertson, Consultant, Robertson Emergency Planning Inc giving a thought-provoking keynote address forecasting the future of employment for the information professions, foreseeing growth for seniors' librarians, community outreach archivists, and information security professionals. followed by two panels of speakers, made up of archivists and librarians alike, who spoke of their own career paths and gave advice for students graduating into an uncertain economy. Active involvement in professional organizations was a recurring recommendation.

Of especial use to students were the group and individual sessions that followed, and as MLIS student Andrea Brown put it, "I'm looking for as much information as I can find to be successful in this economic downturn." The participation of all the professionals was greatly appreciated, and they in turn seemed to enjoy sharing their experience with the students. Panelist Susannah Tredwell, law librarian at Lawson Lundell, commented that she enjoys giving students "as much information as possible... anything we can do to help students shine."

At the End of the Day

The event was neatly summed up by MLIS student Tania Alekson, "everyone always seems happy to welcome students to the profession and to help get you on your way." Students left in good spirits, a little re-assured that with persistence and creativity there are still jobs to be had in today's economy.
