

The Library Connects Our Community

The Library Connects our Community (F15) session, presented by June Stockdale of the Nelson Public Library and Emma Dressler of the Fernie Heritage Library described how these two libraries set overarching goals such as 'continuing to understand the community and how to meet its needs' (Nelson) and 'enriching lives and community' (Fernie). With the support of their trustees, staff and volunteers these libraries are truly the third space of their communities.

Both the Fernie Heritage Library and Nelson Public Library have placed themselves firmly in the centre of their respective communities. Emma and June detailed the many activities and tasks undertaken by themselves and their staff to ensure the importance and relevance of the libraries' collections, services and roles in the community and how participants could learn from their experience and success.

Methodology for connecting with their communities has commonalities such as planned, targeted communications and careful attention to and aligning with the priorities of local government. Networking, novel partnership development and relationship building have featured prominently in the processes. Through moving services and personnel out of the library building into the community and always asking the question – 'How can the library serve your group better?' each library has created a positive perception of the library in the community. The presentation reinforces the concepts that link vibrant library and vibrant community and shows how these libraries have "created a broad, inclusive, approachable, accessible license to read."
