Canada's Prime Minister Wields Excessive Power

features; the House of Commons, Members of Parliament, and Cabinet minister. The paper will explain

how the Canadian PM holds power over these bodies, and what implications this invested power holds.

The paper will also address how certain constraints on the prime minister are not effective in limiting the

powers of the prime minister. Therefore, in this paper, I will argue that power has been overly centralized

in the hands of the prime minister because of the prime minister's ability to control sessions of

Parliament, the use of excessive party discipline, and the control over Cabinet appointments. I will draw
