It is a great honour for us to present the sixth volume of the Simon Fraser University Undergraduate Journal of Psychology. Since this journal's inception, our goal has been to provide undergraduate students with the unique opportunity to engage with the publishing process within the academic community. Many psychology students aspire to continue their careers in an academic setting and this journal can provide students with their first opportunity to experience what it is like to publish their own reviews or original research.

This year we received 29 submissions, 28 of which were from SFU students. Twenty-five of these articles were critical review pieces and four were original research.
